

Our Track Record

In 2006, in collaboration with the James Irvine Foundation, ConnectEd played a key role in developing and launching a transformational approach – Linked Learning -- in a demonstration project with nine California school districts, including Long Beach, Sacramento, Los Angeles, Porterville, Oakland and Pasadena. These districts demonstrated significant increases in student credit accrual, college eligibility, and graduation rates compared to before Linked Learning was implemented.

Which entity owns (any trademarked) "Linked Learning"? Because ConnectEd didn't register as a Calif. charity (as required by law) timely, or until 2011 and when chased down to do so. Depending on who contracted with whom, this also reflects on ALL the school districts involved, and any related Departments of Education County or State.

If the former, that reflects [negatively] on the ethics of ALL the involved school districts. MEANWHILE, it expanded out of state, looks like, despite this track record of noncompliance with the State of California Office of Attorney General-supervised requirements for doing business as a charity (i.e., tax-exempt).
